But take a short trip around the sides and front of the automobile and it is quickly clear this little beauty is in a league all of its own.

Welcome deception

A glearning blue exterior - comparable to what William Houghton calls an Oxford blue - gives way to a complementing light blue leather interior.

The vehicle features a 1000 ce 4-cylinder engine, which Houghton said is a very simple engine.

Though the engine Riself is nothing lancy, William Houghton said the Morris Minor offers a fantastic drive.

"It sounds like it's going really fast," he said. "But it's not."

The Morris Minor 1000 tops out only at 65 mph, he said.

The Morris Minor 1000 was introduced in 1948, William Houghton suid, and was designed by Alec fasigonis, the same person who created the Mini.

The Morris Minor, William Houghton said, was supposed to be afferenable to the working class.

Years later, a British man by the name of Charles Ware opened a business selling and refarbishing Moenis Minors.

"He bought hundreds of these cars," William Houghton said. "And he even owns a factory in Bangladesh and can make any part for it." William Houghton

William rooughoon bought his car through Ward's business and said that upon making a purchase, buyers are given a spare kit of everything that might be needed if it horke down – points, plugs, things unheard of now that are needed with this care.
